Friends in Christ,

Jonah 2:10 "And the Lord spoke to the fish, and it vomited out Jonah upon the dry land. "

Matt. 12:40 (Jesus is speaking) "For just as Jonah was three days and nights in the belly of the fish, so for three days and three nights the Son of Man will be in the heart of the earth.

For Jonah it was a death followed by a resurrection. For Jesus, it would be the same. For both, the experience was followed by the vocation of preaching... a preaching that would affect their whole world. One was a little known prophet, the other was the world's creator.

In the case of Jonah, the whole city of Nineveh responded to his preaching with repentance, and turned to God. In the case of Jesus, his emergence from those three days and nights signaled a crucial event for the human race. His work became God's chief Word The saving Word of the Gospel to be preached as the central redeeming event of all time.

And it continues to be that as it comes to people through the central theme of Christian preaching the proclamation of the Gospel. The proclamation is now 2,000 years old, and the message is the same: that Jesus Christ, the Son of Man and the Son of God descended into the depths of separation from God to suffer the wrath and death that was rightfully ours. His death broke the grip of death, forcing death to release all who were held in its dominion. And the harvest he brought up, in his resurrection was that of all those souls, among which are yours and mine.

That's why the Lenten season has such a heavy significance for us. The cross is God's pivotal, crucial act of "shifting the blame" from our account to that of his blameless Son. After that payment is made God declares us to be sinless, in the body of his resurrected Son. It is that proclamation which gave us life, and which now continues to keep us alive.

That's why preaching is so important. And always will be. The message goes from the faith of one to the faith of the next, that the death-experience of God has become the life-experience of all who come with Him, out of the jaws of death into the full experience of life.

Come, worship with us this Lenten season as we focus our attention on Jonah's descent into the belly of the fish and on the sacrificial death of Christ on the cross for it is only through Good Friday that Easter has real meaning.

We wished a happy birthday to our February ladies, six of whom were present at our meeting.





CLARIFICATION of Statements made at Annual Meeting

In my address to the congregation at the annual meeting I mistakenly said that Pastor Trutwin and Pastor Moll did not want Kent to leave the ELCA. They do not want to be involved in the center of discussion at Kent. But they pray for our unity in Christ. Following are some thoughts that I have about the Human Sexuality Social Statement. I share these views with many of my colleagues in the ministry. These thoughts are not to be divisive but to let you know how your pastor feels about issues in the church. You deserve that.

It's a good social statement, and it affirms many things about human sexuality, which need affirmation. The decision to open the ministry of the church to gay and lesbian pastors living in committed, life-long relationships has proven to be very controversial.

It would have been good, for me anyway, if the decision would have come after my retirement. Other church bodies have made this decision in the past and others will be facing it in the future. Homosexuality is not an issue for many people today, even those who sit in pews on Sunday morning. They know and love the Bible and interpret everything through the lens of the Gospel, which is what Lutherans do.

As for myself, I do not intend to leave the ELCA, a church I still love.

Most of my colleagues in the ministry believe the vote to change the ministry policies of the ELCA did not involve a doctrinal issue which is basic to our Christian and Lutheran faith as we profess it in our creeds. That's where we would have drawn the line.

Over the years, human institutions have disappointed and angered me many times, including every church denomination and every congregation I've ever been a part of. Likewise, every pastor, I've ever met, including this one, has been found lacking, and sinful. And FYI, every single member I've ever known in all the congregations I've been associated with, I've found lacking, as well as sinners!

Let me also say this morning that, I don't pretend to understand some things about God's creation, like homosexuality. Over the years I've known many people who are gay. Some have been friends and co-workers in the kingdom. I know how much they love the Lord, and they have many wonderful gifts to share as pastors in the church - as St. Paul says in Romans chapter 10, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news."

No matter what we feel or think, this is still about love and being loving people as followers of Jesus Christ. Christians are to love like Jesus loved. "Love one another as I have loved you." If we don't, then how are we any different from the rest of the world?

I love and miss those who are not here on Sunday morning, and I pray that even in the midst of our disagreements we can come together to worship and serve the Lord we all love.



Book Review

Is it possible to be both gay and Christian? Joe Dallas thought so.

For six years he was both actively gay and a church attending Christian. STAINED GLASS WINDOW PROJECT COMPLETED

The stained glass window project originated in 2006 when a former member made a contribution to establish a fund for the roadside windows in the sanctuary. This fun was greatly enhanced in 2008 with a check for \$28,213. Kevin

Gerschefske presented the check in memory of his parents, Gene and Carol.

The Stained Glass Window Committee, led by Lois Gonseth, worked closely with the Long Rage Planning Committee to allow Kent members the opportunity to be involved in the process of selecting an artist. Sandy Johnson of Art Attack in Sunrise Beach was selected to complete the windows. Meeting with Sandy, the two committees approved the theme of Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Work on the stained glass began in late September. The completed windows were installed on Christmas Eve day. We thank Sandy for the beautiful windows and Lois for her leadership during the completion of this project.

The total cost of the windows was \$12,000 so the fund now has a balance of \$17,658. Long Range Planning discussed perhaps adding some decorative glass on the windows in the sanctuary lakeside but in talking to Kevin Gerschefske, he expressed a desire to dress up the Columbarium area including a rock with scripture from his father's memorial service as well as some shrubbery and concrete benches. Members are checking into the cost of these items. If there were monies available after improvement to the Columbarium it may still be possible to enhance the windows in the sanctuary.

Long-Range Planning report: There was no meeting

Evangelism report: Minutes of their meeting were presented, encouraging new member recruitment, as well as disseminating information about Kent Memorial in the community via handing out business cards from Kent Memorial, PSA announcement on the radio, road sign possibilities and brochures to the local Chamber of Commerce.

Ministry Fund report: There was no meeting

Jennifer will put a note in the newsletter that the council will address absentee ballots later in the year, as no action can be taken on it until the next Annual Meeting in November per our Constitution.
