PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends in Christ,

Here we are a week into the season of Lent and the weather has certainly been providing a gloomy background for the season of confession, contemplation, and repentance. No one longs for the Sun of righteousness more than I.

I keep you all in prayer each day. I know there are illnesses, many individual cares and challenges that each one faces. As the Lenten hymn says so simply and eloquently: "I want Jesus to walk with me (us)"!

As the weather starts to break, we observe the migration of some of our "snowbirds" back to the area. It is good to see you again, and we look forward to greeting those who will return soon.

There is much that makes us anxious and fearful these days. Not only are there great crises in the world, but we also face our own individual battles each day. When we become anxious and fearful, it colors almost every other aspect of our lives. It causes us to look for reasons why we experience these hardships. Our very relationships may be strained by tensions caused by this anxiety, and our faith may even be shaken by uncertainty about the future.

It is especially at uncertainties like this when we must rest in the arms of God, when we must avoid the temptation to strike out in fear or to over-react to frustrations because we feel vulnerable. It is at times like this that we need to gather together, to remind ourselves of those things that can never be taken away: the love of God, the forgiveness and grace of Christ, the blessed assurance that even if things seem to crumble around us, we are God's own beloved children.

There is much that would cause us to question and doubt this truth. That is why we do not practice our faith by ourselves. We come together in places like Kent....to tell the old, old story, to share the sacraments, to sing the familiar and the new praises, to lift up prayer for one another, to practice the reality of being a family.

When we are alone at times like this or left to ourselves, we often become even more desperate. Weekly worship and daily prayer keep us plugged in; remind us of the great truths of life. There are plenty of things in this world which tell us lies and half truths. Above it all, hear the voice of Jesus: "Lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the ages."

Tenebrae is a Latin word meaning "shadows." During the service, all lights are gradually extinguished except for the Christ candle. At the end of the service, the candle is carried from the sanctuary, symbolizing the apparent triumph of death. After a loud noise is heard symbolizing the moment of Christ's death—when the earth shook and the curtain of the temple was torn in half, when the purpose of the cross was fulfilled—the candle is returned, showing not even death can overwhelm our Lord, who is the Light of the world. We are left in darkness save for that one Light of Hope, the Light of Christ who rises again to live and reign to all eternity.



Díd you know...

There is a seemingly well-kept secret at Kent. We have a walking path! It's an easy-to-walk 1/8 mile long path between our parking lot and the highway. There are flower beds along the path that add beauty and color to our world all summer long. Who knew?!



Well, Linda Williams, Sally Burke and I know because we try to keep the beds weeded. I want to draw your attention to those flower beds because I would like to make a significant addition to those beds and the walking path and I need your help.

The addition I am suggesting isn't to buy flat after flat of blooming flowers that will be pretty for one season. This addition will add beauty and color—and a reason to make use of our walking path—that will be there year after year

I am suggesting we "plant" miniature versions of what are known as "Barn Quilts" in our flower beds and elsewhere along the path. A


"barn quilt" is a piece of plywood that is painted to look like a quilt block then displayed on the side of a barn, corn crib, etc. These "barn quilts" are often 8' square – big enough to easily be seen from the road. [You may Google barn quilt to see more examples.]

The versions I would like to do would be 2' square and since we don't have any barns or corn cribs along our walking path, the squares would be mounted on posts and planted in the flower beds. One side of the plywood square would be painted as a quilt block. The other side would share the


name of the quilt block and a verse of scripture that relates to the block or a quote that could become the focus of meditation and prayer while walking the path.

As I see it, the first step is to decide which quilt block patterns to use and appropriate scripture for each block. This is the first place where you can help, but trust me, it won't be the last. After we've made those decisions, and chose colors of paint the way a quilter would chose fabric, we'll need people who aren't afraid to use power tools to cut and prep the plywood for painting. Since I don't 'do' power tools, I'll need help with that part, too.

After the base coat of paint is dry the fun part starts. With your help, we will paint the quilt block on one side and the lettering on



I will be applying for Thrivent Action Team money to help with this project (after all, plywood and paint doesn't come cheap!), but don't want to wait to get started. Those of you who quilt, write down your suggestions for which quilt blocks to use. Those of you who have a passage of scripture that is especially meaningful to you, write that down. Those of you who would like to help, let me know & we'll get started.





Those of you who were at the February WELCA meeting or at the annual congregational meeting and were introduced to the Thrivent Action Team program may skip ahead to the next article. To those of you who have not yet heard about Thrivent's newest way to help its members care for and strengthen our congregation and community, I'd like a moment of your time.

Thrivent, as did its predecessors Lutheran Brotherhood and Aid Association for Lutherans, has a long standing history of helping care for congregations and communities. A program that has recently been introduced to our area is their newest way of building on that history.

Thrivent members are being given an opportunity to live out Kent's mission to "Share Jesus with all" through their leadership of a Thrivent Action Team. While the team leader must be a Thrivent member, those who help carry out the work of the team do not have to be.

What does an Action Team do, you ask? I'll answer your question with one of my own. What needs doing? What need do you see here at Kent or out in the community?

Do you think the Kent family and our local community members could benefit from a seminar on recycling, or how to plan healthy meals, or changing our landscaping to help rather than harm our beautiful lake?

Is there a service project that volunteers could tackle? Do we have a congregation member who could benefit from having hand rails installed or the front steps of their home replaced? Is there someone in the community who needs help with something like this? Would it be a good idea to make certain that the families whose children attend Hurricane Deck and/or South Elementary all have working smoke detectors in their homes? An Action Team could be formed to buy and install them. (At the annual meeting, Kathy Fair described an Action Team that she will be applying for. Ask her about it...but only if you have a few minutes to spare.)

Is the Social Ministry committee starting to plan their annual fund raiser? We can set up an Action Team to work on that & use the Thrivent money to help cover the expenses.

Money? Did you hear me say something about money? Why, yes! Yes, you did. That's where Thrivent comes in. When Thrivent approves an Action Team, they provide up to \$250.00 to spend on advertising for a seminar, or lumber to build some steps, or groceries for a fundraising supper or well, you get the idea. The possibilities are endless.

So....how do we go about it? The first thing we need is...a need. What needs doing? What can we do in our congregation or in our community to share Jesus with all?

Secondly, if you are a Thrivent member you go to Thrivent.com/ActionTeam. You'll find more information on the Action Team & how to apply. It's easy-peasy. Joyce Wanamaker and Kathy Fair have both acted as Action Team leaders and can tell you first hand how easy it is.

But what if you aren't a Thrivent member? You can go to the Thrivent web site and become an "Associate" member for \$20/year and qualify to lead one Action Team a year. OR you can bring your idea to either Joyce or Kathy. They will put you in contact with a member of the congregation who is a member and is willing to act as a team leader.

Each Thrivent "Benefit" member (a benefit member is someone who owns a Thrivent "product" like insurance or investments) can lead up to two Action Teams a year. Suppose there are 25 Thrivent members in our congregation. That means 25 people who could each lead 2 Action Teams. That's 50 Action Teams with access to \$250.00 to work towards meeting the needs of our church family and our community. Do the math with me: 25 Thrivent members x 2 Action Teams/year x \$250/team = \$12,500 for us to use to help "Share Jesus with all."

If this article sounds like a commercial for Thrivent Financial, it kind of is. But only because I don't know of another group that is willing to provide this much support for us as we work to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Matthew 25: 34-40 says "Then the King will say to the people on his right, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father! Come and possess the kingdom which has been prepared for you ever since the creation of the world. I was hungry and you fed me, thirsty and you gave me a drink; I was a stranger and you received me in your homes, naked and you clothed me; I was sick and you took care of me, in prison and you visited me."

The righteous will then answer him, "When, Lord, did we ever see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you a drink? When did we ever see you a stranger and welcome you into our homes, or naked and clothe you? When did we ever see you sick or in prison and visit you?"

The King will reply, "I tell you whenever you did this for one of the least important of these brothers of mine, you did it for me."

So...what are you willing to do?

Laurie Care Center – Karen Mellody reported that volunteers would be needed at the upcoming Valentine's Day party. Eldeen Hanke announced February 19th as the date of the upcoming Guild meeting and March 6th as the date of an upcoming fund raiser. She also stated that she and Karen would have tickets to sell for the fund raiser. The tickets will be \$15 each.

Scrip Sales – the profit to date on the scrip sales is \$888.54. Karen reported that she and Sheryl would like to have at least one more person to help take and place orders. Kathy Fair volunteered to help with this. Karen and Kathy will get together to go over writing up the deposit & placing the orders.

Senior Center – Joyce Wanamaker reported that there were still some openings on the sign-up sheet and that the center is looking for some people interested in serving on their board of directors and as an accountant.

Sunshine Lady – Lorraine Boyd reported sending 6 get well cards, one farewell card and one sympathy card.

Care Core – Sheryl Boos reported there had been no needs in January.

Kids Klub – Diane Ziehl reported that the Kids Klub room and the TV room in the basement have new curtains & that the kids noticed right away. Attendance has been running at 11-12 each month and there is a little more parental involvement at the meetings. In January some of the kids were involved in doing a skit on David & Goliath.

Kathy asked that people think about how we can take advantage of this new program to help our church and our community.

Eldeen Hanke asked the group to consider a suggestion for the annual May luncheon. She suggested that we might request a small donation for the May luncheon with all the proceeds going to Community for Christ or other charitable effort. Eldeen stated that she was only interested in having members think this over & there was no action taken on this suggestion.

Eldeen Hanke shared an idea to hold occasional "Craft Days" where members would gather to make crafts to sell at the annual bazaar. She reported that another local church does this to create inventory for a "store" at their church that took in approximately \$1500 last year. There would be a memorial service at church on Saturday, February 7th for long time member Mary Gordon. There will be a potluck lunch following the service. As there was no other business, Sheryl adjourned the meeting. We gathered to share the Lord's Prayer. Including our guest speaker, there were 17 ladies in attendance.
