Friends

'This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. ¹³No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father.'

The Surgeon General recently declared a public health emergency for an epidemic, an epidemic of loneliness. Along with all of the other problems and challenges that people are facing these days, many are facing those problems alone, lonely and isolated, sometimes afraid, sometimes angry, but suffering just the same.

Another recent study that I read, said that this epidemic of loneliness was made worse by the covid pandemic. The initial isolation and social disruption that we all experienced intensified people's sense of loneliness, but following the pandemic people are still and increasingly uncomfortable with being part of community, of being both physically but also emotionally close to other people. People are, the study said, terribly lonely, but also afraid to engage in new friendships. This explains, at least to some degree, why people are still having such a hard time coming back to the activities and groups that they formerly enjoyed, including church.

Friendship is one of the greatest gifts that God blessed us with. God gave us people to love and people to love us. Beyond our family relationships God has filled our lives with people who encourage, love and value us. Friends make our lives richer. Friends give our lives meaning and purpose. And indeed, friends are an important and necessary part of a healthy life.

This is, I think, an under-appreciated part of our lives together as God's people. God does indeed call us together in these collections that we call churches so that we can develop deep and meaningful friendships with our brothers and sisters in Christ. Bound together by that common love of our Lord, we can truly grow in our love for one another. It is here in this place (and places like it) where we can learn to love people who are different from ourselves, who have different views of the world, different backgrounds, different opinions. It is here we can grow in friendship. And through that friendship, grow in our love for Christ and the world around us.

Thank you all for being friends, for loving one another, and caring for one another. Continue to make new friends with the people God brings to our congregation. Continue to bring your friends to be a part of our community of believers. Friendship isn't the only thing that happens in

God's church. It may not even be the most important thing. But in a world that is struggling with an epidemic of loneliness, in a world where people are afraid of being hurt and rejected and where community is becoming more and more rare, the friendship that we offer here in our gathering of believers is truly precious.

Thank you all for being friends!

Unapproved Minutes for September 19, 2023

In Attendance- Pastor Ed, Carol Hansen, Michael Wagner, Jim Mellody, Mike Ward, Wendy Blomberg, Sheryl Boos, Barb Yount, Kathy Fair, Bill Work, Gail Kruse, Al Mohling and Katherine Lacroix

Meeting called to order at 6:00 pm by President Kathy Fair

Dwelling in the Word: Jim Mellody opened with devotion

Guest Dan Garrett spoke to us about the Proposed Amendments to the Kent Memorial Lutheran Church Constitution. After discussion Dan recommended the acceptance of the proposed changes. Michael Wagner made a motion to accept the recommendation, seconded by Wendy Blomberg and all approved. Discussion was held on the Operational Ethics Policy. Dan Garrett made a recommendation to keep, in paragraph #7 "on an annual basis" referring to every Congregational Representative getting a copy of the policy annually. Michael Wagner made a motion to accept the recommendation, seconded by Wendy Blomberg and all approved.

Minutes- A motion to approve the August Council meeting minutes was made by Bill Work, seconded by Wendy Blomberg, all approved.

Treasurer's Report- Gail Kruse presented

Pastor's Report- Pastor Ed reported he has conducted eight worship services. He has had three home visits, one shut-in visit and four counseling visits. He attended the meetings of Altar Guild, Christian Education, Evangelism, Worship & Music, Social Ministry and Congregational Council. He has attended the Men's Bible Study, the Women's Bible Study and Wednesday Bible Study. He has participated in Buddy Packs, Cruise Worship, Grief Support Group, Rummage Sale and WELCA. Pastor shared how excited he was to have little people in church and that some will attend Sunday School. Pastor reported that we may have five to twelve people interested in becoming members. He spoke about the decline in church attendance in the last 10 years, and how it was reported people don't feel loved, or there are congregational differences. What they look for is a strong outreach, spiritual growth and to experience community. Where can they go to find these experiences? Church! Pastor feels Kent Members do a very good job in these areas.

Committee Reports- Christian Education reported all Sunday School classes will resume October 1st from 9-9:45 am. -Evangelism reported they will celebrate Joel & Mary Lou Hellman's anniversary on October 11th. God's Work Our Hands went well. Cookies were delivered to Am-

bulance, Fire and Police departments, hospital, Resource Officers, Hurricane Deck School and Little Tigers Learning Center. There is still plenty of room for the Queen Esther show. Budget & Finance -All Mohling stated that TD Ameritrade was bought out by Charles Schwab and that transition to the new account was seamlessly complete. Scholarship -One student has not been able to be reached or has not contacted Kent. Long Range Planning has been going through old storage and signage. -Stewardship reported they will focus on 11 Traits of Good Stewardship. Don't bury it, use it! -Columbarium- Bill Work reported they are working with Ingrid Niemann to place a cross in the Columbarium area. -Mutual Ministry reported they have completed staff interviews. -Property reported they have been mowing, killing weeds, replaced a light fixture ballast, repaired landscaping block for the north church sign and taken in all outdoor service equipment. They are still waiting for Mainstreet Asphalt to restripe and mark the handicap emblem across the front with no parking lines in front of the ramp. Brenton with 24 Hour Heating & Cooling Services replaced the number 9 furnace for the sanctuary. Hans with Creative Vision replaced the flushing mechanism in the men's restroom. -Social Ministry reported they have helped with \$1,092.00 in needs. Bingo fundraiser was a great time and lots of fun. Christmas Loving Tree will be up November 12th. Names and lists have already been obtained. -Worship & Music reported they will host a cookout at the parsonage on October 4th, meat, buns, coffee and hot chocolate will be provided. Side dishes and desserts will be handled as a potluck. -WELCA reported seven ladies stuffed 40 critters. Community for Christ helped 146 families in August. (931 families to date) They will do birthday cards for the residents at the Laurie Care Center. They will be distributing 40 Buddy Packs at Hurricane Deck School. Newcomer's luncheon was well attended. Please see Committee reports for full details. Thank you ALL who share your time and talents!

Old Business- Endowment Fund Committee-pending. Council Retreat will be Saturday September 23rd. 8-12 at Hurricane Deck School. Resume the search for a new AV tech. Kathy will talk with Camdenton School.

New Business- Kathy Fair will be doing soup on Sunday starting November 1st. Al Mohling went over the first draft of the 2024 Annual Budget. Ruth Osterbur has agreed to replace Barb Yount on Church Council.

Correspondence- Thank you note from Community for Christ for our donation of \$500.00.

Love Abides... **Grief Support Group**


