Welcoming Children (and each other)

Linda was a beautiful little girl. She was full of life and energy and spunk, lots and lots of spunk. She was incredibly intelligent and had the rare trait for a child of being able to be completely focused on something she was interested in. She was strong-willed. She was independent. And for many people, little Linda was a handful.

She struggled in school because she was often ahead of her classmates and when she became bored she found something else to pay attention to. It might be another subject, or a book she was interested in, or it might be annoying the little boy sitting behind her, but if her teachers weren't able to give her something to focus on, she would find something herself. She was one of those children who had both perfect grades and lots of visits to the principal's office.

She struggled with adults, and she struggled with her classmates as well. She wasn't interested in the things in which they were interested, and she was unwilling to pretend that she was. She would rather stay in and read a book than go out for recess and play hopscotch or basketball.

As you can imagine, Linda was labeled a "difficult child", and as her struggles continued her demeanor changed as well. She became sullen, sometimes angry, often times withdrawn.

When her family moved to a new community, they hoped that it would be a new start for Linda, that she would make friends and would get a fresh start in the school system, and that she might become a part of a church home.

And so Linda and her family, Mom and Dad and her two sisters, showed up for worship one Sunday. Mom and Dad and sisters soon found their place and their people, but Linda, solemn and sober sat in the back pew all by herself. That is where Arleen found her.

Arleen was one of the widows of the congregation, and she saw something in this beautiful, sad young girl that touched her soul. Indeed, I think maybe she saw something of herself in her. Arleen sat down and spoke with her for a few minutes, and I don't believe Linda ever raised her eyes or even acknowledged her, but Arleen was every bit as singleminded and focused as her new friend, and she had lots more practice and patience.

Arleen was the first. Week after week she and Linda developed a relationship that would benefit them both, but soon Linda and her entire family became a part of that church family. Linda had brothers and sisters, aunts and uncles, and grandparents galore, people who accepted her just as she was, people who challenged her, who were encouraged her,

people who were willing to gently correct her. Little Linda had an entire community who loved her even and maybe especially when she was difficult.

A few Sunday's ago, Jesus said "Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me." (Luke 9:37) We usually interpret that statement metaphorically. Jesus is indeed pointing out how we are to welcome those who are considered unimportant and powerless, and children in his day especially, were an example of that. But I think Jesus is also speaking literally. There is no overestimating how important, valuable and helpful a church family can be for a child.

There may be no other place where a child can be loved and accepted in the way they can be in a congregation. There are few places where they are allowed to be a part of adult society as equal and valuable members. Fewer places still where they can learn and grow and make mistakes without judgement or scorn.

It is a special and holy thing God has given us in the church. For all of its faults and failings, the church can be, and so often is, one of God's greatest blessings. A church family, a group of people who love and care for one another, who experience God's presence together, who answer God's call together, is a rare, a holy and a precious community. God absolutely changes and saves lives in these gatherings. God blesses them and through them God blesses the world.

Love one another as God has loved you.

Love and welcome the children in our midst.

Be a part of this community, this church family.

Hearing God's call and responding in love, share Jesus with all.

FINANCIAL NOTES:

- A. Current Financial Situation Kent's giving position in August and for the year has stabilized, allowing Kent to be back into normal cash flow for 2024. Kent's actual expenses for the year through August are slightly below budget. As a reminder, insurance premiums of \$12,000 for the year were paid in full in January. Thank you to all those who prayerfully give offerings to support Kent's mission.

Dwelling in the Word: Jim Mellody opened with devotion

Minutes- A motion to approve the August Council meeting minutes was made by Sheryl Boos, seconded by Wendy Blomberg, all approved.

Treasures Report- Al Mohling presented

Pastor's Report- Pastor Ed reported he has conducted ten worship services and one Cruise worship service. He has had two shut-in visits, one hospital visit and one counseling visit. He attended the meetings of Altar Guild, Christian Education, Endowment, Evangelism, Social Ministry, Worship & Music and Congregation Council. He has attended the Men's Bible Study and the Women's Bible study. He has participated in Buddy Packs, Rummage Sale, School Health Fair, Grief Support Group and WELCA. Pastor continues to remind us to take care of ourselves and be sure not to overdo. Pastor thanked everyone for a successful Council retreat. It's good to get to know one another better and to think about how it is that God is working through our congregation. Bingo night was lots of fun. The busy season continues, with the Newcomers Luncheon, Sunday School starting back up, Pet Blessing service will be held October 5th at 5pm and Guess Who's Coming to Dinner October 18-20th. Pastor will be having a cookout at the parsonage in October 9th at 5pm.

Committee Reports- Budget & Finance- Al Mohling presented council with the 2025 budget. Discussion was held. All paid staff will receive a 2.5% raise. -Property reported Lynn Burke has fixed the rotted wood frame mountings for both front speakers and added a short railing section in the outdoor worship area. Property committee would like to request committees to come up with a five year plan/vision. A sort of wish list for each committee. Discussion was held on the remaining balance from the insurance check after roofers are paid. adults and children will start on the 22nd. Wednesday evening Bible study will begin on the 25th. -Evangelism reported "Gods Work. Our Hands." went well and cookies were delivered. As the littles put it "God's Hands did Gods Work today!" Guess Who's Coming to Dinner, October 18-20th. -Worship & Music reported they are researching and possibly purchasing a new communion chalice that has a small area within it to accommodate grape juice. Toni Wagner has agreed to return to hand bells with Tracey Atzeni as a substitute. Harvest Garden will be set up November 16th at 10am. Potluck Cookout at the Parsonage October 9th at 5 pm. -Social Ministry reported Bingo had a great turnout raising \$3,397.00. The needs are mostly rent. CADV Loving Tree will go up November 10th. Gifts will need to be returned by December 8th. -Scholarship has two students left to hear from. -Endowment committee shared Gift Acceptance Policies and Guidelines. We will discuss next month.
