#### **Good Samaritans**

³⁶Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?' ³⁷He said, 'The one who showed him mercy.' Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise.' Luke 10:36-37

While fires rage through Los Angeles the people of North Carolina are still trying to recover from the horrific hurricane that brought such tremendous flooding to their area. In just the last couple of months we have been witnesses to two of the worst natural disasters in the history of our country. Our neighbors have lost their homes, their places of employment, indeed almost everything that makes up their everyday lives. The needs are truly tremendous, and they will continue for years as our friends begin to rebuild their lives.

No one was planning for these events. To be sure, we know that every year there are hurricane and there are fires. We know that natural disasters are a part of life in our world. But the scope of these disasters is far beyond what I think anyone could have predicted for this winter.

But of course, that is the way of life in this world. We can plan for many things, for disasters and calamities, but we can not plan for them all nor can we know when they will happen. Almost by definition they take us by surprise.

The man who was attacked by the robbers on the road down from Jerusalem to Jerico probably didn't expect to be beaten and robbed. And I'm pretty sure that those who encountered him on the road weren't planning to find him their either. The Samaritan, maybe more than the others, probably wasn't prepared to encounter someone in need of his help. But there the man was, injured, naked, desperate. He probably hadn't scheduled extra time on his trip to stop and care for the man, or to take him to the inn. He was probably late for whatever appointment he was on his way to. And I doubt he had budgeted to pay for the man's expenses either. But when the need arose for him to show love to his neighbor, of all the people who encountered the man who had been assaulted, the Samaritan helped him.

We have the opportunity to love so many neighbors these days. We have been planning to help some of them through our gifts to Community for Christ, the Social Ministry Committee, world hunger programs and the like. But like the man on the side of the road we have neighbors whose needs come out of the blue. A hurricane destroys entire communities. Fires destroy entire neighborhoods.

Daily we encounter people in our lives who are in need of our mercy, our care and our love, and Jesus encourages us to go and do as the Samaritan did. He encourages us to bind up the injured, clothe the naked, provide shelter for the homeless, and to feed the hungry. He calls us to love our neighbors. Today those neighbors are in our own community, and

they are in North Carolina and in Los Angeles.

We are at the same time collecting food items (and money if you would like) for Community for Christ (Souper Bowl Sunday), and encouraging one another to contribute to Lutheran Disaster Response for the fires in Los Angeles. We hadn't planned to have 2 programs going on at the same time. Some of us may not be able to help this time, others of us may only be able to do one, and some of us will be able to share with both opportunities. Through our gifts and our prayers, we will love the neighbors God has given us to love. It is our calling. It is who we are.

God bless you all, as you "go and do likewise."

Meeting called to order at 6:00 pm by President Jim Mellody

**Dwelling in the Word:** Kathy Fair opened with devotion.

**Minutes**- A motion to approve the December Council meeting minutes was made by Al Mohling, seconded by Wendy Blomberg, all approved.

Treasures Report- Al Mohling presented

Pastor's Report- Pastor Ed reported he has conducted five worship services, three Wednesday Advent services and Christmas Eve service. He has had one shut-in visit and three counseling visits. He attended the Men's Bible Study. He helped Social Ministry loading gifts. He participated in Zero the Hero, Buddy Packs, WELCA Christmas party and Council Christmas party. Pastor thanked everyone who participated in Advent and Christmas festivities. It all matters more than you know. Pastor stated how lucky we are to be able to ZOOM when the weather is not safe for travel.

Committee Reports -Budget & Finance- Al Mohling shared the Memorial report with a balance of \$9,300.00, suggestions will be forthcoming. Al reported that expenses for the year were over income by \$1,000.00, which was better than last year. The Property Insurance Policy has been reviewed and the premium is \$18,753.00, Workman's Comp. is \$1,500.00 in addition. That brings a combined increase of \$6,253.00. We are still lucky to be insured as many Churches are having trouble finding affordable insurance. The Endowment Committee has received a generous gift of \$7,500.00. Audits have been completed and letters sent. -Property reported Bill Hebrank with Discount Services was hired to put down salt and remove snow from the church parking lot. Bob Karls worked in the cave basement stapling up pieces of the ceiling insulation working the insulation around the water pipes to keep them from freezing. He also spent time removing snow, putting down salt and chipping ice and frozen snow away from the fellowship hall doors and in front of the dumpster gates. Pastor Ed has been helping to keep the sidewalks safe by spreading down salt. Jake and Linda Jacobson, Steve Clark, Bill Work, Pastor Ed, Lynn Burke, Curt Reams, Tom Ringsdorf and Don Wilken all showed up with only a few hours' notice to take down the outdoor nativity scene before the ice and snow came. They will price entry

doors with a push button opener. Thanks to all of you for volunteering!! -Long Range planning reported they are focusing on the 75th anniversary. They will be meeting the third Monday of every month at 10 am. Anyone can attend. -Stewardship focus will be "Stewardship through Prayer". Prayers from the front of our Hymnals. -WELCA reported Jane Maher is the new President for the committee. -Christian Ed reported Wednesday evening Bible study and Adult Sunday School has started. Diane has new material for her class. VBS plans will begin soon. -Evangelism reported there are Birthday cards to sign for Don Peterson and Marilyn Peterson. -Social Ministry reported they served 146 Families in 2024 with expenses being \$16,000.00. They have already helped 14 families this month. CADV has reached out about giving Bibles to the people they help. Pastor has ordered a paper back easy read Bible to share with them. -Endowment Committee- Appointment of members- Jim Mellody made a motion to appoint Dan Garrett, Al Mohling, Michael Wagner, Kathy Fair and Bob Karls as Endowment Committee Members. **Old Business**- 3-5 year plan discussion. Kathy Fair will create a form to help with the process. 75th Anniversary plans are underway.

New Business- Share the Harvest requested the use of the Fellowship Hall Saturday, April 5th Michael Wagner made a motion to allow Share the Harvest use of the Fellowship Hall on Saturday, April 5th with no usage fee. Wendy Blomberg seconded the motion and all approved. Symphony of the Magic Dragon will perform at Kent Monday, April 28th and the Chorale will perform on Sunday, May 4th. Volunteers will be needed after service April 27th to help set up. Vice President Michael Wagner will lead the meeting next month. President Jim Mellody will be gone on a cruise. Funds available to assist those in need represent the generosity of our congregation.

During 2024 a total of <u>136</u> families were assisted with rent, utilities, gasoline, medications, car repairs and other needs, in the amount of <u>\$16,050.28</u>. This represents an increase from 2023 where 99 families were helped and \$11,600 funds spent.

Balance January 1, 2024 was \$3,218.57 with an ending balance December 31, 2024 of \$6,182.57. A monthly report is shared with the council and in the monthly newsletter.

The Committee is thankful and appreciative for all the support offered by our congregation and friends, for your outpouring of heartfelt caring for your community.

By way of information, Community for Christ (CFC) is an outreach center and emergency food pantry serving parts of Morgan and Camden counties. Assistance for rent, utilities, gasoline, prescription and food are some of the areas of help provided. CFC is a faith based organization supported by 7 area churches. All funds available to CFC are through donations and retail sales.

CFC is supported by Kent by volunteering your time every 5 weeks at CFC. Your time supports retail sales, accepting donations, sorting and pricing.
