### Remember that you are dust...

The season of Lent is complicated. These forty days leading up to Easter are a solemn and somber time. It is a season in which we are encouraged to look at ourselves and recognize our need for forgiveness and salvation. It is a season where we are challenged to repent of our sins. It is a season where we are invited to change and to live lives that are pleasing to God and of service to our neighbors.

The season of Lent is indeed filled with deep and heavy topics, challenging ideas and the dark reality of Jesus' death on Good Friday. One could hardly be blamed for finding Lent to be depressing and difficult.

But even the darkest parts of the season of Lent, the horrors of Good Friday, the reality of human sin and evil, our own failings as the children of God, all of these are illuminated by the light of the empty tomb. Good Friday is not the end of the story. The world is not left having killed the Son of God. We are not left alone in our failures and our failings. Throughout the season of Lent, as we walk alongside Jesus and the disciples on the road to the cross, Jesus is walking with us. We are not alone as we look into our own hearts and our own lives and realize that they are lacking. Jesus is with us, leading us not just to the cross, but through the cross to the day of resurrection.

Lent doesn't end with a cross. It ends with an empty tomb and a risen Lord. It doesn't end with our condemnation, but with our salvation. It doesn't end with our deaths, but with our resurrections.

May this Lent be a time of renewal and resurrection for all of you. May the dark and difficult parts of Lent be filled with the grace and love of God. May we all reach Easter morning ready to be raised from the death of our old lives, resurrected to new and holy lives in Christ.

The season of Lent it complicated. May it also be life giving.

### **FINANCIAL NOTES:**

A. Current Financial Situation – Kent's giving position in 2025 started on an even keel. Four months of insurance premiums of \$5300 were paid, which created expenses over offering for the month. Our insurance policy was renewed but the annual total increased from \$11,000 to \$16,000. Thank you to all those who prayerfully give offerings to support Kent's mission.

- B. Thrivent Designation –Through Thrivent Choice[®], Thrivent members can contribute to organizations and causes they care about—and influence how Thrivent distributes some of its charitable grant funding through Choice Dollars[®]. Please consider going into your Thrivent account online and designating Kent as that organization. In the last year, these distributions allowed Kent to contribute \$2,500 to Kent Social Ministry, \$2,000 to the SE US Flood/Hurricane victims, and \$2,000 to the CA Wildfire victims. - C. Thrivent Action Teams Thrivent provides \$250 per project to kick-start a fundraiser, educational event, or service project for Kent or the community. Each qualifying Thrivent member can submit two projects per year for approval by Thrivent. This is an excellent way to provide funds to do projects and not have to use Kent budgeted monies. - D. Schwab (previously TD Ameritrade) Account As you make distributions from your retirement 401Ks, 403Bs, IRAs or other investments, please visit with your financial planner/accountant about the possibility of transferring some of those funds to the Kent Schwab account or Kent checking account. The transfer might be able to be made with no capital gains tax consequence to you. If you have questions about this, please contact Gail Kruse or Al Mohling.
- E. County Property Tax Freeze If you are 62 years of age or over, are the owner of a homestead in Missouri, and are liable for the payment of real property taxes on such homestead, you may qualify for the freeze. The amount of the taxes will freeze, and not increase, when the taxpayer becomes age 62. Only taxes will be frozen, not assessments or levees. For example, remodeling which expands square footage and results in a 50 percent increase in the assessment will trigger a reassessment of the property taxes. Individuals need to apply annually (prior to June 30) at your County Assessor/Collector office to have their taxes frozen by bringing your ID and proof of property tax payment. # CONGREGATION COMMITTEES Places where you can help!

**Altar Guild**—The Altar Guild of Kent Memorial serves under the auspices of the Worship and Music Committee and is responsible for all things having to do with the liturgical space and its furnishings. The Guild meets on the first Tuesday of the month.

**Christian Education**—Coordinate and provide Sunday School and Adult Bible Study. Meets the third Tuesday of the month.

**Columbarium**—Management of Kent's Columbarium, including maintenance, expansion and memorial gifts. Meets as needed.

**Evangelism**—Assists the pastor and the council with many ministries that serve the various needs of our community and the social needs of our congregation as well as promoting our events and ministry to others in our community. Meets the first Monday of the month.

**Long Range Planning**—assist with the planning and execution of major events in the church, including the celebration of Kent's 75th in ministry. Meets the third Monday.

**Property**—Responsible for maintaining the church, parsonage and the grounds.

**Scholarship**—Administration of the Stewart-McFaden Endowment Fund, established in 2011 to provide scholarships for area seniors

**Social Ministry**—Responsible for the implementation of programs to see that the congregation shall live by faith active in love. Works closely with Community for Christ, a non-profit food pantry and thrift store to meet the needs in our community. Meets the second Monday.

**Stewardship**—Brings the message of all types of stewardship to the congregation through monthly articles in the Kent Happenings newsletter and occasional presentations during worship.

**Women of the ELCA (WELCA)**—The women's ministry of the ELCA, we commit to grow in faith, affirm our gifts, support one another in our callings, engage in ministry and action, and promote healing and wholeness in the church. Meets first Tuesday of the month.

**Worship and Music**—Strives to bring meaningful worship services to the congregation of Kent Memorial Lutheran Church. Meets the second Wednesday of the month.
