Absent- Meeting called to order at 6:00 pm by President Jim Mellody

**Dwelling in the Word:** Ruth Osterbur opened with devotion.

**Minutes**- A motion to approve the March Council meeting minutes was made by Kathy Fair, seconded by Wendy Blomberg, all approved.

Treasurers Report- Gail Kruse presented

Pastor's Report- Pastor Ed reported he has conducted four worship services and four Wednesday evening services. He has had two home visits, three shut-in visits, one hospital visit and one counseling visit. He attended the Adult Sunday School class and the Men's Bible Study. He attended the meetings of Altar Guild, Christian Education, Endowment, Evangelism, Long Range Planning / 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, Social Ministry, Worship & Music and Congregation Council. He attended the Area Pastor's meeting with Bishop Candea, Grief Support Group and WELCA. Pastor stated that although it is a busy time we need to remind ourselves to enjoy the power of new life that brought Jesus from the grave. Hold on to the promise of life and resurrection. He thanks all who have helped make Lent a meaningful season. It is a big job that makes a big difference in one another's lives and faith. All that you do matters! Pastor thanked all of those working on the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary plans. In meeting with Bishop Candea and other Pastor's discussion lead to the decrease in church members as a whole; we need to keep in mind how to reach out to include others and increase ministries to the church.

Committee Reports- Budget & Finance reported they have six members that do Simple Giving. It will be reintroduced to remind people of the option. Total amount of Memorials is at \$10,000.00. They have some ideas that are being discussed. The estimates that were made in the Pastor's portion of the budget were close with just some small differences. However, we will be over budget for property insurance by \$6,000.00. Pastor stated we are lucky; many churches are double our insurance. -Property reported they completed their "walk around". They found some higher up windows need paint, which they may hire out. They have set the pageant wall, mowed and cleaned up the grounds. A Bid for sealing the parking lot was obtained from H & J Construction for the amount of \$3,279.00. Bob Karls made a motion for the Property Committee to procede and allow up to \$3,500.00 from the Property Management account for the resealing of the parking lot. Wendy Blomberg

seconded the motion and all approved. Two of the crosses in the pageant area were broken in the storms and will need to be repaired. -Long Range reported they are discussing a possible two day event for the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration. Using Saturday as a fun day and open house, -Christian Ed reported VBS will be held July 16-18<sup>th</sup> with the theme being "Goodness, Gracious, and Genesis". Adult Sunday school class will resume in the fall. Wednesday class will resume after Easter through May. -Evangelism reported we will celebrate Chuck and Joyce Wannamaker for their 60<sup>th</sup> Wedding Anniversary on April 27<sup>th</sup>, and Bob Brumm's 95th Birthday (17<sup>th</sup>) in May. They will be discussing going to see the story "David" at Sight and Sound. -Worship & Music reported there are about 18 people who zoom on Sunday's. Two potted palms were ordered to put beside the altar. Communion will be at the rail May 11<sup>th</sup> due to concerts. Several Chorale members will sing with the choir on Good Friday. Maundy Thursday Worship and Seder meal to begin at 5pm, and Good Friday service at 6. The Easter Garden will be set up April 19<sup>th</sup>. The Baptism for Reiney Morgan will be on Saturday. -Social Ministry reported they have paid out \$2,174.00 in March and \$821.00 so far for April. They plan to rejuvenate the Blue Box, explain what it is for, discuss how CFC works, where the monies go and share some stories of those they have helped. -WELCA reported they are discussing long range plans. -Scholarship reported applications have been turned in and they are being reviewed. -Endowment Committee reported they are working to finish spending and investing information for a brochure.

**Old Business**- Easter breakfast is planned and ready. Many Thanks to Bob, Karole and their wonderful Grandchildren for hosting!

**New Business**- The Food Bank for Central & Northeast Missouri has requested the use of the fellowship hall for their Regional Meeting May 28<sup>th</sup>. A building use form will be completed and charges will apply.

### **FINANCIAL NOTES:**

A. Current Financial Situation – Kent's giving position continues to be consistent with prior years. Six months of insurance premiums of \$11,000 have already been paid in the first three months, so our year to date expenses are slightly over our budget average. Our insurance policy was renewed in January but the annual total premium increased from \$11,000 to \$16,000. Thank you to all those who prayerfully give offerings to support Kent's mission.

- **B.** Thrivent Designation –Through Thrivent Choice<sup>®</sup>, Thrivent members can contribute to organizations and causes they care about—and influence how Thrivent distributes some of its charitable grant funding through Choice Dollars<sup>®</sup>. Please consider going into your Thrivent account online and designating Kent as that organization. In the last year, these distributions allowed Kent to contribute \$2,500 to Kent Social Ministry, \$2,000 to the SE US Flood/Hurricane victims, and \$2,000 to the CA Wildfire victims. - C. Thrivent Action Teams Thrivent provides \$250 per project to kick-start a fundraiser, educational event, or service project for Kent or the community. - D. Schwab (previously TD Ameritrade) Account As you make distributions from your retirement 401Ks, 403Bs, IRAs or other investments, please visit with your financial planner/accountant about the possibility of transferring some of those funds to the Kent Schwab account or Kent checking account. The transfer might be able to be made with no capital gains tax consequence to you. If you have questions about this, please contact Gail Kruse or Al Mohling.
- E. County Real Estate Property Tax Freeze If you are 62 years of age or over, are the owner of a homestead in Missouri, and are liable for the payment of real estate property taxes on such homestead, you may qualify for the freeze. The amount of the taxes will freeze, and not increase, when the taxpayer becomes age 62. Only taxes will be frozen, not assessments or levees. For example, remodeling which expands square footage and results in a 50 percent increase in the assessment will trigger a reassessment of the property taxes. Individuals need to apply annually (prior to June 30) at your County Assessor/Collector office to have their real estate property taxes frozen by bringing your ID and proof of property tax payment.
